

As far as the menu and options, we have offered a lot of new menu items and using the students comment box to our advantage.



Foster Child: A child who is living with a family but who is under the legal care of the welfare agency or court may be listed on your family application. List the child's "personal use" income. October 2023, Page 24

The MTSS-I (Multi-Tiered System of Supports Integrated) Team worked hard over the summer to develop a framework that targets students' social, behavioral, and academic needs and gives interventions based on data to close skill gaps that will improve student outcomes. Kindergarten through 6th grade students were assessed at the beginning of the school year to identify their needs, and then skill-based groups were formed. During class intervention time, every student is working with a teacher on mastering skills necessary to succeed with grade-level content. Teachers and interventionists collaborate to deliver the most effective instruction for all students, and data is collected on a timely basis to determine if interventions are effective. The MTSS-I team has developed systems and processes for both early intervention and tiered support services. When the MTSS-I model is implemented with fidelity, all students are exposed to Tier 1, core instruction and specialized, explicit interventions. This model will ensure that all students are given the resources, tools, and strategies to be successful. The goal is for all of our students to show academic, behavioral, and social - emotional growth throughout the school year.

History: The Backpack Program was established in January 2008 by Terry Satterly. It was the first such program in Northern New York. The club was started after it became apparent that some of our ACS students were experiencing hunger issues on the weekends. In today's world, peace needs to become more than just a word. On September 21, 2023, Alexandria Central art students will took part in an International art and literacy project, Pinwheels for Peace by "planting" pinwheels as message of peace in front of the school building.

Pinwheels for Peace is an art installation project started in 2005 by two Art teachers, Ann Ayers and Ellen McMillan, of Coconut Creek, Florida, as a way for students to express their feelings about what's going on in the world and in their lives. In the first year, groups in over 1,325 locations throughout the world were spinning pinwheels on September 21st - there were approximately 500,000 pinwheels spinning throughout the world. At last count, in 2019, over 4.5 million pinwheels were spinning in over 3,500 locations



This project is non-political – peace doesn't necessarily have to be associated with the conflict of war, it can be related to violence/intolerance in our daily lives, to peace of mind. To each of us, peace can take on a different meaning, but, in the end, it all comes down to a simple definition: "a state of calm and serenity, with no anxiety, the absence of violence, freedom from conflict or disagreement among people or groups of people."

On the morning of September 21, 2023 ACS art students placed pinwheels along the front sidewalk as our own Pinwheels for Peace installation.

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





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RIGHTS UNDER FERPA FOR ELEMENTARY AND SECONDARY SCHOOLS

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) affords parents and students over 18 years of age ("eligible students") certain rights with respect to the student's education records, including:

- (1) The right to inspect and review the student's education records.
- (2) The right to request the amendment of the student's education records that the parent or eligible student believes are inaccurate.
- (3) The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent.
 - Exceptions which permit disclosure without consent include directory information; disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests; to another educational institution; for health and safety emergency reasons; to foster care agencies; pursuant to a subpoena or court order; for financial aid purposes; to accrediting organizations; to parents of a dependent student; for audit/evaluation purposes; for conducting studies.
 - A school official has a legitimate educational interest if the official needs to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.
 - Upon request, the School discloses education records without consent to officials of another school district in which a student seeks or intends to enroll. [NOTE: FERPA requires a school district to make a reasonable attempt to notify the parent or student of the records request unless it states in its annual notification that it intends to forward records on request.]
- (4) The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by the School District to comply with the requirements of FERPA. Student Health Records: For PreK through grade 12 students, health records maintained by the District, including immunization records and school nurse records, generally are considered "education records" subject to FERPA. Since student health and medical information in education records is protected by FERPA, the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (HIPPA) Privacy Rule excludes such information from its coverage.

PARENTS' BILL OF RIGHTS FOR DATA PRIVACY AND SECURITY

The Alexandria Central School District seeks to use current technology, including electronic storage, retrieval, and analysis of information about students' education experience in the district, to enhance the opportunities for learning and to increase the efficiency of our district and school operations.

The Alexandria Central School District seeks to insure that parents have information about how the District stores, retrieves, and uses information about students, and to meet all legal requirements for maintaining the privacy and security of protected student data and protected principal and teacher data, including Section 2-d of the New York State Education Law.

To further these goals, the Alexandria Central School District has posted this Parents' Bill of Rights for Data Privacy and Security.

- (1) A student's personally identifiable information cannot be sold or released for any commercial purposes.
- (2) Parents have the right to inspect and review the complete contents of their child's education record. The procedures for exercising this right can be found in Board Policy 7240 (Student Records: Access and Challenge). You may access these policies from the District's website.
- (3) State and federal laws protect the confidentiality of personally identifiable information, and safeguards associated with industry standards and best practices, including but not limited to, encryption, firewalls, and password protection, must be in place when data is stored or transferred.
- (4) A complete list of all student data elements collected by the State is available at
- http://www.pl2.nysed.gov/irs/sirs/documentation/NYSEDstudentData.x1sx and a copy may be obtained by writing to the Office of Information & Reporting Services, New York State Education Department, Room 863 EBA, 89 Washington Avenue, Albany, New York 12234.
- (5) Parents have the right to have complaints about possible breaches of student data addressed. Complaints should be directed in writing to the Chief Privacy Officer, New York State Education Department, Room 863 EBA, 89 Washington Avenue, Albany, New York 12234.



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Supplemental Information About Third Party Contracts: In order to meet 21st century expectations for effective education and efficient operation, the District utilizes several products and services that involve third party contractors receiving access to student data, or principal or teacher data, protected by Section 2-d of the Education Law. The District recognizes that students, parents, and the school community have a legitimate interest in understanding which of the District's vendors receive that data, for what purpose, and under what conditions. The District has undertaken the task of compiling that information, and of insuring that each new contract adequately describes

- (1) the exclusive purposes for which the data will be used,
- (2) how the contractor will ensure that any subcontractors it uses will abide by data protection and security requirements,
- (3) when the contract expires and what happens to the data at that time,
- (4) if and how an affected party can challenge the accuracy of the data is collected,
- (5) where the data will be stored, and
- (6) the security protections taken to ensure the data will be protected, including whether the data will be encrypted.

FAMILY EDUCATIONAL RIGHTS AND PRIVACY ACT (FERPA)

Notice for Directory Information: The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA), a Federal law, requires that Alexandria Central School District, with certain exceptions, obtain your written consent prior to the disclosure of personally identifiable information from your child's education records. However, Alexandria Central School District may disclose appropriately designated "directory information" without written consent, unless you have advised the District to the contrary in accordance with District procedures. The primary purpose of directory information is to allow the Alexandria Central School District to include this type of information from your child's education records in certain school publications. Examples include:

- (1) The annual yearbook
- (2) Honor roll or other recognition lists
- (3) Graduation programs
- (4) A playbill from a drama production
- (5) Sports activity sheets

Directory information, which is information that is generally not Directory information, which is information that is generally not considered harmful or an invasion of privacy if released, can also be disclosed to outside organizations without a parent's prior written consent. Outside organizations include, but are not limited to, companies that manufacture class rings or publish yearbooks. Alexandria Central School District has designated the following information as directory information: Student's name; Address; Telephone listing; Electronic mail address; Photograph; Date / place of birth; Major field of study; Dates of attendance; Grade level; Participation in officially recognized activities and sports; Weight and height of members of sports teams; The most recent educational agency or institution attended.

If you do not want Alexandria Central School District to disclose directory information from your child's education records without your prior written consent, notice of refusal must be sent in writing to Brianne Kirchoff, at 34 Bolton Avenue, Alexandria Bay, NY 13607 by September 15.

DISCLOSURE OF STUDENT INFORMATION TO MILITARY RECRUITERS AND/OR COLLEGES

In addition, two federal laws require local educational agencies (LEAs) receiving assistance under the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (ESEA) to provide military recruiters, upon request, with three directory information categories—names, addresses and telephone listings—unless parents have advised the LEA that they do not want their student's information disclosed without their prior written consent.

Parents, or students who are at least 18 years old, wishing to exercise their option to withhold their consent to the release of the above information to military recruiters and institutions of higher learning must notify the High School Principal by September 30 with a letter requesting that the student's name, address, and telephone number are not released to military recruiters or institutions of higher learning, and must be signed and dated by the parent or the student if 18 years or older.

RIGHTS UNDER THE PROTECTION OF PUPIL RIGHTS AMENDMENT (PPRA)

PPRA affords parents certain rights regarding our conduct of surveys, collection and use of information for marketing purposes, and certain physical exams. These include the right to:

Consent before students are required to submit to a survey that concerns one or more of the following protected areas ("protected information survey") if the survey is funded in whole or in part by a program of the U.S. Department of



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Education:

- (1) Political affiliations or beliefs of the student or student's parent;
- (2) Mental or psychological problems of the student or student's family;
- (3) Sex behavior or attitudes;
- (4) Illegal, anti-social, self-incriminating, or demeaning behavior;
- (5) Critical appraisals of others with whom respondents have close family relationships;
- (6) Legally recognized privileged relationships, such as with lawyers, doctors, or ministers;
- (7) Religious practices, affiliations, or beliefs of the student or parents; or
- (8) Income, other than as required by law to determine program eligibility.

Receive notice and an opportunity to opt a student out of:

- (1) Any other protected information survey, regardless of funding;
- (2) Any non-emergency, invasive physical exam or screening required as a condition of attendance, administered by the school or its agent, and not necessary to protect the immediate health and safety of a student, except for hearing, vision, or scoliosis screenings, or any physical exam or screening permitted or required under State law; and
- (3) Activities involving collection, disclosure, or use of personal information obtained from students for marketing or to sell or otherwise distribute the information to others.

Inspect, upon request and before administration or use:

- (1) Protected information surveys of students;
- (2) Instruments used to collect personal information from students for any of the above marketing, sales, or other distribution purposes; and
- (3) Instructional material used as part of the educational curriculum.
- (4) These rights transfer from the parents to a student who is 18 years old or an emancipated minor under State law.
- (5) Following is a list of the specific activities and surveys covered under this requirement:
- (6) Collection, disclosure, or use of personal information for marketing, sales or other distribution.
- (7) Administration of any protected information survey not funded in whole or in part by ED.
- (8) Any non-emergency, invasive physical examination or screening as described above.

Parents who believe their rights have been violated may file a complaint with: Family Policy Compliance Office, U.S. Dept of Education, 400 Maryland Ave, SW, Washington, D.C. 20202-5901.

DIGNITY FOR ALL STUDENTS ACT (DASA)

The District seeks to create an environment free of harassment, bullying, and discrimination; to foster civility in its schools; and to prevent conduct that is inconsistent with its educational mission. The District, therefore, prohibits all forms of harassment and bullying of students by employees or other students on school property and at school functions. In addition, other acts of harassment, bullying, and/or discrimination that occur off school property may be subject to discipline or other corrective action, where such acts create or would foreseeably create a risk of substantial disruption within the school environment, where it is foreseeable that the conduct, threats, intimidation, or abuse might reach school property.

To report any incident of bullying on school property (including athletic fields, playgrounds, and parking lots), as well as at school-sponsored events or activities, contact Co DASA Coordinators: Ms. Kathryn Durand or Ms. Michelle Mourino. Administrators must report incidents of bullying or bias-based harassment to the NYS Department of Education. Additional information including reporting forms and the full Board policy can be found on the Alexandria Central School District website's homepage.

NON-DISCRIMINATION AND ANTI-HARASSMENT

The Board of Education is committed to providing an environment free from discrimination and harassment. Accordingly, the Board prohibits discrimination and harassment on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, sex, sexual orientation, age, disability or other legally protected category. Such actions and occurrences are prohibited regardless of whether they take place on School District premises or at school-sponsored events, programs, or activities held at other locations.

The Alexandria Central School District provides equal opportunity for students and does not discriminate against any student enrolled in (or any candidate for admission to) its programs and activities on the basis of actual or perceived race, color, national origin, sex, disability, or age. Further, the District does not discriminate on the basis of weight, ethnic group, religion, religious practice, sexual orientation, gender, or any other basis prohibited by state or federal non-discrimination laws, and provides equal access to its facilities to the Boy Scouts and other designated youth groups.



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The School District will act to promptly, thoroughly, and equitably investigate all complaints of discrimination and will promptly take appropriate action to protect individuals from further discrimination.

HOMELESS STUDENTS

Students in temporary housing (i.e., homeless children and youth) will have access to the same free and appropriate public education, including public preschool education, as other students, as well as access to educational and other services necessary to be successful in school.

The McKinney-Vento Liaison for Students in Temporary Housing: The District has designated Michelle Mourino as the District liaison for students in temporary housing (otherwise referred to as the McKinney-Vento liaison). The District's McKinney-Vento liaison serves as one of the primary contacts between families experiencing homelessness and school staff, district personnel, shelter workers, and other service providers. The McKinney-Vento liaison coordinates services to ensure that homeless children and youth enroll in school and have the opportunity to succeed. Access to Free Meals: The District will provide free meals to all children identified as homeless. They do not have to complete a free or reduced-price meal application. When the McKinney-Vento liaison or a shelter director provides a child's name to the District's school food service office, free school meals will commence immediately.

Comparable Services: The District will provide services to students in temporary housing comparable to those offered to other students in the District, including: transportation services; educational services for which the child or youth meets the relevant criteria, such as services provided under Title I or similar State or local programs; educational programs for students with disabilities; educational programs for English learners; programs in career and technical education; programs for gifted and talented students; and school nutrition programs.

Student Privacy: Information about a student in temporary housing's living situation will be treated as a student education record and will not be deemed to be directory information under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). A parent or guardian or unaccompanied youth may consent to the release of a student's address information in the same way they would for other student education records under FERPA.

WELLNESS & NUTRITION

The Alexandria Central School District is committed to providing a school environment that promotes and protects children's health, well-being, and the ability to learn by fostering healthy eating and physical activity before, during, and after the school day.

The District has established a wellness & nutrition committee to establish goals for, and oversee the development of, the District's local wellness policy.

PESTICIDE USE

New York State Education Law Section 409-H, effective July 1, 2001, requires all public and nonpublic elementary and secondary schools to provide written notification to all persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff regarding the potential use of pesticides periodically throughout the school year.

The Alexandria Central School District is required to maintain a list of persons in parental relation, faculty, and staff who wish to receive 48-hour prior written notification of certain pesticide applications. The following pesticide applications are not subject to prior notification requirements:

- a school remains unoccupied for a continuous 72 hours following an application;
- anti-microbial products;
- nonvolatile rodenticides in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- nonvolatile insecticidal baits in tamper resistant bait stations in areas inaccessible to children;
- boric acid and disodium octaborate tetrahydrate;
- the application of EPA designated biopesticides;
- the application of EPA designated exempt materials under 40CFR152.25;
- the use of aerosol products with a directed spray in containers of 18 fluid ounces or less when used to protect individuals from an imminent threat from stinging and biting insects including venomous spiders, bees, wasp, and hornets.



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In the event of an emergency application necessary to protect against an imminent threat to human health, a good faith effort will be made to supply written notification to those on a the 48-hour prior notification list.

To be placed on a list to receive 48-hour prior notice of pesticide application, please send notice to Darin Trickey, Head Custodian, Alexandria Central pesticide representative, at 34 Bolton Avenue, Alexandria Bay, NY 13607. Include your name and student's name, address, phone number, and e-mail address.

ASBESTOS NOTIFICATION

In accordance with the Federal EPA Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), all public and private K-12 schools in the United States are required to inspect their facilities for asbestos. An additional requirement of the regulations is that parents and staff are to be informed that the inspection was done.

A copy of the AHERA management plan is in the main office and available for your inspection. For additional information or questions, contact Darin Trickey, Head Custodian, Alexandria Central School District, 34 Bolton Avenue, Alexandria Bay, NY 13607.

STUDENT WORKING PAPERS

All minors (under the age of 18) require employment certificates. School districts in New York State are responsible for issuing employment certificates to qualified applicants. Minors in the Alexandria Central School District can contact Meredith Graveline (mgraveline@acsghosts.org), the designated certifying official at Alexandria Central School, to apply for their working card by calling 315-482-9971 or by email.

General Information: An employment Certificate may be used for an unlimited number of successive job placements in lawful employment permitted by the particular type of certificate.

A new Certificate of Physical Fitness is required when applying for a different type of employment certificate, if more than 12 months have elapsed since the previous physical for employment.

An employer shall retain the certificate on file for the duration of the minor's employment. Upon termination of employment, or expiration of the employment certificate's period of validity, the certificate shall be returned to the minor. A certificate may be revoked by the school district authorities for cause.

Prohibited Employment: Minors 14 and 15 years may not be employed in a factory (except in delivery and clerical employment in an enclosed office thereof), or in certain hazardous occupations such as: construction work; helper on a motor vehicle; operation of washing, grinding, cutting, slicing, pressing or mixing machinery in any establishment; painting or exterior cleaning in connection with the maintenance of a building or structure; and others listed in Section 133 of the New York State Labor Law.

Minors 16 and 17 years of age may not be employed in certain hazardous occupations such as: construction worker; helper on a motor vehicle, the operation of various kinds of power-driven machinery; and others listed in Section 133 of the New York State Labor Law. In order to work past 10 p.m. on nights before a school day, both school and parental consent will be required. For work past 10 p.m. on a night before a non-school day, only parental consent will be required.

Generally, employment is illegal for minors under the age of 14 years. No minor under 14 years of age may be employed in any capacity except:

Newspaper Carrier, provided the applicant is at least 11 years old; as a farm worker employed, however only in the hand-harvest of berries, fruit and vegetables, provided the applicant is at least 12 years old; as a worker on the minor's home farm or doing other outdoor work not connected with a business for his or her parents or guardians.

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VISITORS TO THE SCHOOLS

The Board welcomes parents and other district citizens to visit the district's schools and classrooms; however, certain limits must be set for such visits:

- (1) Anyone who is not a regular staff member or student of the school will be considered a visitor.
- (2) All visitors to the school must report to the office of the principal upon arrival at the school. All visitations must have a purpose. All visitors are required to sign the visitor's register,
- (3) Visitors attending school functions that are open to the public, such as parent-teacher organization meetings or public gatherings are not required to register.
- (4) Teachers are expected not to take class time to discuss individual matters with visitors.
- (5) Any unauthorized person on school property will be reported to the principal or his or her designee. Unauthorized persons will be asked to leave. The police may be called if the situation warrants.
- (6) All visitors are expected to abide by the rules for public conduct on school property contained in this code of conduct.

PUBLIC CONDUCT ON SCHOOL PROPERTY

A. Prohibited Conduct

No person, either alone or with others, shall:

Intentionally injure any person or threaten to do so.

- (1) Intentionally damage or destroy school district property or the personal property of a teacher, administrator, other district employee or any person on school property, including graffiti or arson.
- (2) Disrupt the orderly conduct of classes, school programs or other school activities.
- (3) Distribute or wear materials on school grounds or at school functions that are obscene, advocate illegal action, appear libelous, obstruct the rights of others, or are disruptive to the school program.
- (4) Intimidate, harass or discriminate against any person on the basis of race, color, creed, national origin, religion, age, gender, sexual orientation or disability.
- (5) Enter any portion of the school premises without authorization or remain in any building or facility after it is normally closed.
- (6) Obstruct the free movement of any person in any place to which this code applies.
- (7) Violate the traffic laws, parking regulations or other restrictions on vehicles;
- (8) Possess, consume, sell, distribute or exchange alcoholic beverages, controlled substances, or be under the influence of either on school property or at a school function.
- (9) Possess or use weapons in or on school property or at a school function except in the case of law enforcement officers or except as specifically authorized by the school district.
- (10) Loiter on or about school property.
- (11) Gamble on school property or at school functions.
- (12) Refuse to comply with any reasonable order of identifiable school district officials performing their duties.
- (13) Willfully incite others to commit any of the acts prohibited by this code.
- (14) Violate any federal or state statute, local ordinance or board policy while on school property or while at a school function.

B. Penalties

Persons who violate this code shall be subject to the following penalties:

- (1) Visitors. Their authorization, if any, to remain on school grounds or at the school function shall be withdrawn and they shall be directed to leave the premises. If they refuse to leave, they shall be subject to ejection.
- (2) Students. They shall be subject to disciplinary action as the facts may warrant, in accordance with the due process requirements.
